Dear Friends,

A wise person once said that the church is always within one generation of extinction. Now, while I don't think we have a cause to panic at Christchurch, the followers of Jesus always need to be on their toes and aware of the urgency of the Kingdom of God in the midst of the here and now.

One of the things I think that means, is a constant willingness to re-invent ways of celebrating and declaring our faith.

Hey Presto, Mardi Gras! On 6th March.

Christchurch is this year re-inventing the Mardi Gras festival for Ilkley in 2011. As always with a re-invention, there are changes. We're moving it from Shrove Tuesday to the Sunday before Lent, only a two day move! And we're all joining together at 10am (no Online or 10.30 service that day) for worship and Carnival activities including lunch together.

Mardi Gras is about celebrating and feasting before the fast of Lent begins, so marking the beginning of the spiritual disciplines of denial, self examination, inner cleansing, and reliance on God.

The notice board in the Church Foyer has, for some weeks been advertising this event and explaining a bit more about the carnival colours we're inviting you to wear – green, gold, and purple. Don't worry, we're not forgetting pancakes, and we're carrying on the colours and carnival, and pancake theme to the first Ilkley Pancake Race on the Grove on Shrove Tuesday. Christchurch will be represented!

Such excitement is good for us, then it's time to 'deny ourselves', and in the words of an old hymn find 'a road to God'.

Christchurch Finances – Everyone’s Responsibility

In November, a personal letter signed by Rob Hilton, was sent to members of the Christchurch family reporting on the financial situation which needed action to ensure an unsustainable deficit did not materialise. This letter brought forward the usual yearly Stewardship renewal in February, effectively asking for an immediate increase in contributions by those able. Rob also spoke at the 9 and 10.30 services and this was repeated by another appeal during worship services in December by John Stanley, Chair of the Resources group.

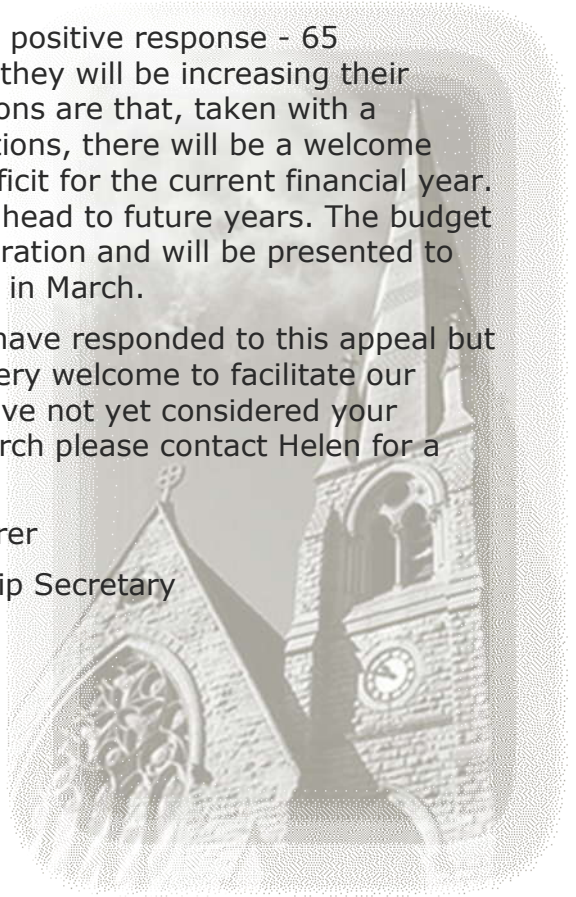
Approximately 250 letters were sent out to households and there have been approximately 100 responses. We did say that there would be a report back on the result of this appeal and give an update on the position.

In general there has been a positive response - 65 respondents have said that they will be increasing their regular giving. The indications are that, taken with a significant increase in donations, there will be a welcome reduction in the forecast deficit for the current financial year. Of course we need to look ahead to future years. The budget for 2011/12 is now in preparation and will be presented to Church Council for approval in March.

Gratitude is due to all who have responded to this appeal but more responses would be very welcome to facilitate our financial planning. If you have not yet considered your financial giving to Christchurch please contact Helen for a response form or a chat.

Give What You Can

Over Christmas the Guardian newspaper re-visited some of the articles it had featured during the year. One such review reminded readers of Tony Ord, a moral philosopher at Oxford University, who set up a society called 'Giving What We Can', inviting people to join with him and his wife in giving 10% of their income to charity for the duration of their working life.

62 people signed up. That may not seem many (how many people, like me, did not see the article when it first appeared?) but he was not discouraged because 10% over a lifetime of relatively young people adds up to millions of pounds. Ord himself has actually given away far more than 10%; he and his wife decided to live on £18,000 a year, and say they don't miss anything.

Also, he says, it is not all altruism. Giving makes him feel happier. He would feel guilty when he had the opportunity to give but didn't. He was quoted as saying, 'Now I feel a lot more at peace with myself,'

Now, what was it that Rob said in his Stewardship sermon last autumn?

As well as facilitating and attending the Discourse Workshop I've been continuing

with the checking of Zam, Luke and Kab Genesis. The next checking session is planned for some time in February, probably again at Horsleys Green.



Thanks for praying for the Referendum in Sudan early this month. It took place on time and, apart from a few isolated local incidents, it all went very peacefully. It seems to be generally expected that the vote will be for Southern Sudanese independence. Please continue to pray for the entire practical out-workings of this.

I now have the go-ahead to book my flights for the Jesus Film Workshop in Juba. I hope to be working with some Mündü translators on adapting their translation of Luke for the script of the film. The workshop runs from 26th March to 16th April, but the staff has been asked to arrive a few days early. I talked to Seme on his mobile phone over Christmas, and he expressed an interest in taking part in this. Dominic has also said he'd like to be involved. Pray it all works out. And pray for me as I start to think about flights, travel insurance, injections and malaria medicine.

What's in a Name?

Sometimes old habits die hard. Often we refer to things in the way we always have done despite things changing. For instance, many of us call radios "transistors" or, going back even further, a "wireless." Perhaps we buy a "record" when it is, in fact a CD, or "video" a TV programme on your Sky+ box.

So perhaps it's understandable when announcing the reading in the service, when we often refer to "the Pew Bibles." We have not had pews in the sanctuary since the 1980's, but the term is yet to disappear! I wonder how long it will be before it does?

MySmallHelp

MySmallHelp was founded in Nepal and the UK by a group of friends in January 2007.

MySmallHelp believe that education is the key to a brighter future for all children.

They are now working in Peru in partnership with local organizations and currently are involved with several projects:

- After the flood in Jan 2010 they helped with emergency aid but are now setting up a long term project building a training centre for guinea pig rearing and helping families set up their own guinea pig rearing business.
- They have helped to find a teacher in the Huayroncoyocpampa community and have set up a knitting cooperative for homeless women.
- They have arranged for education, books and uniforms for children in the Ollantaytaambo region who had previously not been able to attend school.

During the run up to Christmas they raised funds for the Christmas chocolatadas delivering hot chocolate, sweet bread and Christmas gifts to over 30000 people in a mini bus decorated with clowns!

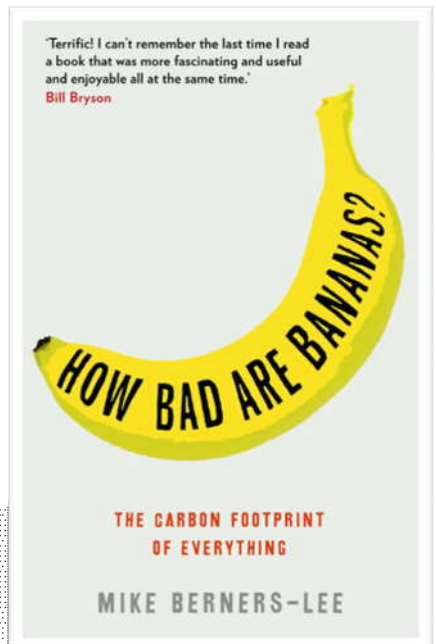


I am reading a book called HOW BAD ARE BANANAS? By Mike Berners-Lee (the Carbon Footprint of everything). I have found it interesting and entertaining, a book to dip into or to read straight through. It is also sobering. Carbon Dioxide equivalents are complex to calculate because the author includes many factors in his analysis. However, they give an easy way to compare the effects of our consumption on the planet. The book shows how our decisions about the food we buy, the holidays we take, how we dispose of our rubbish etc., will affect our Carbon Footprint.

Mike Berners-Lee lives in the North and his company has done research for Booths Supermarket on the carbon equivalents for foods thus giving a local slant on food choices.

Sometimes you can be amazed at his conclusions. Did you buy or receive red roses on Valentine's Day? The carbon Dioxide equivalent of a red rose grown in Kenya and flown here is 350 g, that of a red rose grown in a heated greenhouse in the Netherlands is 2.1 kg. Out of season cut flowers have the largest Carbon Footprint per Kilo. of anything going through the till at the supermarket. Added to this the land taken up by growing them could be used to grow food. Makes you think.....
