

Minister's Letter

Dear Friends,

Leo is a twenty something year old guitar playing singer songwriter. He's a bit tentative, but he's good. He has a skill, he's a musician to his core, and he has a very moving story to tell.

He grew up in a household he thought normal – both parents were heroin addicts, school wasn't for him, and he got into petty crime. Leo went to prison, several times. Leo knew what he'd done was wrong, he was determined to go straight, and every time he came out of prison he determined never to go back. But he couldn't break the cycle.

Then Billy Bragg went into the prison and gave him a guitar and taught him a few chords. He began to strum, and, just like his mentor found that music could take him to a different place, he put all his pent up emotions into his songs and began to perform them – in prison initially, and then, with support, outside when he was released again.

Leo's now started touring and giving concerts – when I heard him talk and sing at Greenbelt, his story moved me. When he was asked about how to stop re-offending in prison he said the answer was easy – most criminals just needed listening to, someone to help them pour out their emotions and make sense of their lives. That's the gift the person who gave him the guitar had given him.

A Christian asked Billy Bragg what the evangelical message of his Guitars into Jail programme was, had Leo heard the gospel, was he a Christian?

I'd like you to think about the relevance of that question.

Let me tell you one more thing – Leo told the crowd that playing to an audience was better than drugs, then he said the Greenbelt



audience was somehow better than the audience at the Glastonbury festival.

Does it matter how 'Christian' the gospel is?

Happy thinking, and let me know what you think!


New Beginnings


The URC Yearbook is available as an A5 book or loose leaf for £16 or on CD for £6. Obituaries are a further £4.

CD Reviews


YFriday – The Great & The Glorious ★★★★★

This is a guitar led worship album which moves along well even if the lyrics are a little light and rely on religious cliché. The songs are clearly written for a worship situation and are towards anthemic – you can imagine a Spring Harvest crowd loving it. Although not as complete as Casting Crowns or Third Day, it grows with each play and is worth having in your collection.



Graham Kendrick – Knowing You Jesus: The Very Best of Graham Kendrick ★★★★★

Kendrick has re-recorded the best of his back catalogue to create this double album packed with classics. Although he is often considered a little dated (he's been going at it for over 30 years) his lyrics are thoughtfully constructed and the arrangements are easy on the ear. If you missed his previous 29 albums, then this is a good starter.




Third Day – Move ★★★★★

Still going strong, here is another typical Third Day album with strong melodies over that great 'southern rock' sound with guitars well up in the mix. There is the usual mix of themes, stories of seekers, of lost souls looking for hope, the need to trust Jesus, God's love available to all.



Ben Cantelon – Running After You ★★★★★

I bought this having heard Ben and his band lead worship at Spring Harvest this year. Although this feels a little light after the live experience, the songs are nicely put together, with a couple of songs bound to become 'classics' such as 'Coming Back'. He comes from the same Soul Survivor stable as Matt Redman and Tim Hughes, which gives a feel to his music, although this is a band sound rather than a solo artist.



It's been a long time coming!


The publication of the new Methodist hymn book (Singing the Faith) is imminent.

The contents' list has been analysed to help us understand how it might be used at Christchurch. The Worship Committee felt a set of words-only books for use in the Sanctuary was unnecessary given our extensive use of printed orders of service and screens, although copies used elsewhere (the Guild, evening worship, funerals, etc) would be useful. Church Council agreed to place a pre-publication order for one music copy (£25) and one words-only copy (£7.50) plus the electronic version (£25). The situation will be reviewed when the musicians, worship leaders, preachers etc have had an opportunity to study "Singing the Faith" in more detail.

We are conscious some folk might like to buy their own copies, however. If you would like to do so, please place your order in writing (with cheque payable to Christchurch) with me by 30th September.

NB Had it occurred to you that "Hymns and Psalms " isn't new any more ? It is now 28 years old!

Stewardship 2012: Vision + Action

The focus for Stewardship next year will be done in a different way and a group has already started to consider how we approach the issues of giving of time and talents and money in a way which will engage the Christchurch community in a more mission focussed approach.

These ideas were brought to the September Church Meeting and information is provided here for those not able to attend the meeting. These are our ideas so far: –

Housegroup material from January 2012 is the book of **Malachi** - with added study/discussion at Sunday services; the Guild; and other areas of Church life, so that those not involved in Housegroups will be able to study and discuss the issues. Malachi has lots to say about the way we worship God with integrity and how we should live our lives to the glory of God.

There are three strands to the 2012 stewardship project - there will be a local Christchurch need, an expansion of Christchurch in the community and an outside mission need. These options fit with Christchurch's 8 Vision objectives and involve a financial and personal time commitment. Both ideas involve the financial aspect with a more interesting focus than just the running costs of Christchurch, with a hope that a renewed commitment to giving will ensure other expenses will also be met. The ongoing need will be met alongside something new and exciting to inspire the Christchurch family.

The options are resourcing one of these projects -

Dan's Den + Christchurch Roof fund + supporting a Children's or Roof based charity in the wider community/world
Dan's Den will need money and volunteers to work with children/families/youth in a play centre + café + **Prayer**

OR

Coffee Centre expansion + Christchurch Roof fund + supporting a Food or Roof based charity in the wider community/world.

Coffee Centre will need more volunteers to staff the café and listening ear; as well as money to expand the physical expansion of the area + **Prayer**

An important aspect of this focus for Christchurch next year will be **making Prayer a priority** in this process – personally and in all the different groups that are a part of Christchurch

Please do talk about these plans ! - the group is excited by what we have discussed so far and would love to hear more from anyone else! The group includes Lis and John Stanley, Ruth Jones and Rob Hilton as well as myself.

Spring Harvest 2012 – Church Actually, God’s brilliant idea

Eleven of us are booked in to go to Spring Harvest at Skegness from 10 April til 15 April 2012. There is still chance to come if you want to join us. Accommodation costs about £250 – £280 per head depending on how many people are booked in. The theme is the church – we love the church and we believe it’s God’s hope for the world.



We’ll look at the New Testament ideas of church - The people of God, the Community of the Spirit, the Body of Christ and the Bride of Christ. And we’ll look at the mission of the Church in our culture and our calling as God’s people. We’ll also be having meals together, going on walks on the beach, swimming, playing crazy golf, shopping – anything you fancy! Leeds Faith in Schools

This is one of the projects that Christchurch is currently supporting. The team leader Dan Chadwick writes:

Since 1994, Leeds Faith in Schools has provided a professional and flexible resource to the changing world of education and young people in Leeds. We currently work in ten

High Schools in Leeds every week. We add value to the curriculum by delivering assemblies, R.E. and Personal & Social Education lessons as well as running lunchtime groups, sports teams and mentoring groups.

Our staff team of seven enthusiastic workers makes such a difference to the lives of young people. I am told that 49% of England's churches have no young people however we estimate that every week LFIS works with over 1,500 young people.

We hope to be positive role models to young people as well as equip young people to enjoy and achieve in life, present Christianity appropriately and relevantly, and facilitate young people's exploration of faith and spirituality.

Recently a head teacher said this of one of our workers. "You are like a magnet, bringing young people together through your positive manner."

This story depicts part of our work, mentoring young people who are finding life difficult. Reece was referred to one of our LFIS workers at a time when no intervention was working in his life. Reece's risky and destructive behaviour was leading him quickly towards permanent exclusion. Over the first few sessions Reece was moody, uncooperative, gave one word answers for many questions and appeared beyond help. However through prayer, through our mentoring sessions God has brought about change. His attendance has improved, his attitudes are optimistic and the choices he is making are positive. We continue to work with Reece and are given much praise by the pastoral leaders in the school for our work.

If you were a fly on the wall at a high school where we work you

might see us in mentoring sessions, some lessons, running a lunchtime club or a prayer group, you perhaps might even see us coaching sport yet as a fly I think you'd be impressed by our assemblies, this Head of Year said recently,

“Your assemblies are engaging, entertaining and always convey a very valuable message to the students.”

ACTS AND RANDOM ACTS OF KINDNESS

-change lives!

Ntombifuthi Dlamini, (not her real name) was a very loving, enthusiastic Caregiver living in a rural area near Hillcrest. Her husband died of HIV AIDS and she was raising her own family of 3: one of whom had matriculated, but is unemployed; one who is re-writing his final year of school; and a 13 year old daughter, Zandile. Her sister died recently, so Ntombifuthi took charge of her young family – a 2 year old girl and a 3 year old boy.

Ntombifuthi was unemployed, but earned money by selling vegetables from her group's communal garden. It was not very lucrative as most people in her rural community grew their own vegetables, but she had no skill to enter the job market. Being aware of her attempts to survive, neighbours would sometimes purchase her vegetables, even though they were growing their own.

Two years ago, Zandile, (then aged 11) started having difficulty walking - tripping over things and being clumsy. The local clinic said it was stress from her father having passed away. It became progressively worse, until in January this year, Ntombifuthi had to carry Zandile on her back to school each day - a 2 kilometre walk! A few months later, the teachers said she should no longer come to school, as it was too difficult for them to manage her, for her legs had become so thin and wobbly she could no longer stand - even if she were supported. She had only attended local clinics as there was no money in the family to transport her to a hospital. At that stage, Phakamisa learnt of the situation and took her to a specialist hospital where she was given permission to apply for a disability grant. Medical tests were conducted and she was diagnosed with HIV AIDS and started treatment; as did Ntombifuthi.

Ntombifuthi's Caregiver Group met and decided to club together to give her a TV or a radio so that Zandile would have something to do, as she lay in bed all day long. When investigated, however, they realized that their idea was too costly for them to afford, so one of the Caregivers GAVE her own TV set to Ntombifuthi and Zandile.

In the interim, Ntombifuthi's son, who was repeating his final year at school, was told not to return, as his school shoes had broken and it is compulsory to wear school shoes to school. His friend next door agreed to share his shoes with him, until replacement shoes could be found. So they attended school on alternate days.

Ntombifuthi became ill and three weeks later, she died. Her Caregiver Group were devastated to hear of her death and immediately arranged

to go and pray at her home. They also arranged that each one would take responsibility for Zandile on a different day of the week. This is a LONG term arrangement..... and to add to it all.....the borrowed TV set had broken.

Meanwhile... The day before we heard of Ntombifuthi's death, someone brought a TV set and a video machine to Phakamisa - just in case someone could use it!? What timing! As we heard of the tragic death of Ntombifuthi, and Zandile's plight, we were able to give not only a TV set, but also a video machine to the little family.

A different story: A local audiology team voluntarily visited Phakamisa to test the hearing of those who cannot hear properly. Initially 18 people were tested and a further 37 are waiting for the next testing days. If anyone has a discarded hearing aid, please, in a random act of kindness, give it to us. It will be re-programmed for people who previously have had no access to assisted-hearing, and will give them a whole new life.

Acts and Random Acts of kindness:

- Fostering 2 children when you have no means of income - caring until it hurts
- Buying vegetables you neither need nor can afford - sharing your resources
- Sharing your school shoes - giving sacrificially
- Piggy- backing a 13 year old to school - nothing is impossible
- Giving away your TV set to someone who needs it more than you do - selflessness
- Committing to care for a very disabled teenager - love
- Volunteering your time - caring
- Supporting an NGO instead of trading-in items - generosity

My dear Friends,

Once again I have been challenged both by people Phakamisa seeks to serve and by others who simply want to help to make the world a better place. I thank them and promise to perform acts or random acts of kindness more faithfully. Do you?

Hi Hetley and All Friends at Christchurch,

Thank you so, so much for the very, very generous donation of 750 pounds towards Phakamisa. You have been incredibly faithful over this 3 year period and we have been most grateful for the security of knowing we could rely on this money coming in from you.

As you know, we cancelled the taxi fund, in its pure, original form, because of problems with the taxis. Instead we give the caregivers vouchers for a local super market where they can purchase groceries - and so still afford to travel to Pinetown. They REALLY rely heavily on this source of support. During devotions today, through her tears, Irene Ntsele asked for special prayers for her 8 year old grandson who was struggling to breathe and was in hospital. I was surprised she was with us. She said her neighbour had offered to sit with the child in hospital, so Irene could come to 'school'.

'Glenda, this is the place I get life,' she explained. 'If I do not come here, I will be dead.'

Well obviously none of that should be taken literally, but clearly it tells us what a critically important role the project plays in the life of those who are really struggling.

Thank you, to each and every person at Christchurch Ilkley, for making it happen for our Caregivers, who would definitely not be able to afford to come here otherwise, because of their meagre income. (The cost of travel is, in some cases, 25% of their MONTHLY income!)

Meeting King James!

In celebration of 400 years of the King James version of the bible extracts from it were read out over a period of 24 hours in August. Churches Together in Ilkley felt that not only was it a time to celebrate, but also a time for the words to be heard in Ilkley.

All the churches took part and members took turns to read verses from Genesis through to Revelation. Each reader read for 15 minutes- sometimes to an audience of 2 people, but often to many more throughout the full 24 hours. Christchurch lower hall was the venue- there was a beautiful flower display and 2 reading desks set up so that there was a smooth handover from person to person. Chris Solomon- a Ben Rhydding member- did sterling work organising the whole event. The passages chosen fitted the time well- extra verses had to be added during the night but some had to be excluded as we drew to a close!

Those who took part enjoyed reading the bible out loud, some came back to hear others reading, some enjoyed reading passages they had never read before and many expressed the privilege they felt when actually doing the reading.

The whole thing was recorded and we had hoped it to go live on the website but that was not to be!

Whatever we think about this version of the bible the reading of it gave food for thought and perhaps gave us a taste of mystery as we read. We hope that those who heard caught a glimpse of God in action and felt His presence in the hearing.
